

It's been a hectic start to our year, but things are settling down a bit now. We have more classes than ever before and are still looking for other interesting things to offer.





LIVE CONCERT FROM DRESDEN – Part of a festival concert celebrating 450 years of the Saxon State Ensemble in September 1998. It is conducted by Giuseppe Sinopoli with works by Vivaldi, Von Weber & Wagner.

NIGEL KENNEDY PLAYS BACH – A delightful 2005 film of a concert in a church in Dingle, County Kerry, Ireland. He plays and conducts the Irish Chamber Orchestra. The whole thing is priceless, particularly the encore.

TUESDAY

YOUNG PEOPLE'S CONCERT – WHAT IS A CONCERTO? – As always, Bernstein explains it all in a masterly manner with a variety of orchestral pieces by Vivaldi, Bach, Mozart, Mendelssohn & Bartok.

BERLIN PHILHARMONIC 1993 – A concert conducted by Sir Simon Rattle before he became Principal Conductor. It shows Berlioz's 'Symphonie Fantastique' and a rare concert hall piece, Rameau's 'Les Boreades' suite.

WEDNESDAY

HAYDN PIANO CONCERTO NO.11 – A beautifully filmed performance by Mikhael Pletnev with the Verbier Festival Orchestra in 2014.

TCHAIKOVSKY PIANO CONCERTO NO. 1 – A flamboyant 2015 performance by Lang Lang with the Orchestre de Paris conducted by Paavo Jarvi.

HANDEL'S WATER MUSIC – A 2016 live concert by the Akademie fur Alte Musik Berlin. A well filmed, finely honed performance.

THURSDAY

SIBELIUS – A superb biography-documentary of the greatest Scandinavian Composer. It features Orchestras conducted by Vladimir Ashkenazy.

FRIDAY

AARON COPLAND – MODERN AMERICAN COMPOSER- 3 pieces by America's finest composer including 2 (ex YPC'S) featuring him conducting/playing.

NEW ORLEANS STREET JAZZ – A group called Tuba Skinny! – great fun.

BAYSIDE U3A WRITER'S DISCUSSION GROUP

The Bayside U3A Writers' Discussion Group meets monthly in the ballroom of historic Black Rock House, where creative energies bounce off the walls as 17 writers share written works of various genres.

Radio play writing is also popular, and since 2013, approximately 20 radio plays have been written by writers in the group, performed by local thespians, recorded and edited by retired ABC technician Raymond Simms, and broadcast on 88.3 Southern FM. First the plays were broadcast in Terri Adams's program *Kaleidoscope* on 88.3 Southern FM, and now more recently, Pauline O'Brien broadcasts one radio play on the third Tuesday of each month at about 9.15am, in her *Community Capers* program. The writer of each play also usually attends the 88.3 Southern FM studios to be interviewed by Pauline.

A special project each year involves the group working with a Bayside Council Artist in Residence to adapt one of their short stories into a radio play. This year we are working with Bayside Artist in Residence writer, Michelle Deans who has kindly offered one of her stories for radio play adaptation.

Whether writing radio plays, poetry, stage plays, short stories, novels or creative messages, there is one thing shared in common by the members of this wonderful group of diverse personalities and talent – an enthusiasm and true love of the written word.

We are pleased to advise that our Committee Member, Vladimir Metter has accepted the role as Brighton Courthouse Officer and has the responsibility for co-ordinating the maintenance and hiring of the Brighton Courthouse (BCH) facility. He is to be sincerely thanked for taking on this role.

The main hall is about 12m x 16m with kitchen and toilets. The kitchen is not adequately equipped for heating food but food not requiring heating on site can be served. The premises has a number of solid tables and enough good quality chairs for about 60 people.

The BCH is available for members to hire on evenings or weekends for family events. It will not be Hired out for 18th, 21st or similar young people party events. It could be used for more sedate social events. The BCH is also available for regular hire but clearly any hiring needs to be outside U3A class times. It is important to note that the hiring of BCH is at the discretion of the Committee of Management.
