

SPEAKER SERIES ... Continuing the climate change discussion

Wednesday 18th October

We received lots of positive feedback from the recent David Karoly lecture on 'The Perils of Climate Change'. One topic of feedback was an interest in hearing not just how big a problem we are facing, but what is being, and what can be, done about it. In response to that, two Bayside U3A members, Rick Campbell and John Nurse will run a session next month on the topic of 'The not so impossible paths to zero carbon'.

Richard (a former Sharebroker and Financial Advisor) and John (a chemical engineer and former Process Technology Director) have previously been involved in a number of projects addressing climate change issues and in particular the development of alternative energy systems.



The session aims to demystify the issues of alternative energy options and answer (in 'laymen's terms') questions such as:

- What renewable energy sources make sense and where?
- What are the constraints and problems (eg power transmission, balancing the electrical supply and
- What role does storage of energy play in addressing these constraints?
- What about the 'hydrogen economy'?
- What opportunities does all this give for Australian industry?

The session aims to make sense of what! We will also have plenty of time for questions and discussion. No need to book, just come along!














Some students prefer to work independently to create their own work based on that week's theme.

We are looking forward to Margaret's insider-look at a pivotal period in Australia's national development.


SENIORS FESTIVAL TO LAUNCH INNOVATIVE BOOK PROJECT

An innovative collaboration between Bayside U3A Writers and the Bayside U3A Painting for Pleasure Groups has led to the creation of *Synergy*, a book celebrating the words of 22 writers and the works of 12 artists. A joyous ode to the creative powers of Bayside residents, the 142-page, A-5 sized, full-colour anthology will be launched by renown local writer and literary journalist, Jane Sullivan, during Seniors Festival this October.

Dr Cheryl Threadgold OAM, convener of the Writers Group, spearheaded the project which rapidly took shape thanks to the enthusiastic support of Nance Silverman, Geoff Rolls, Dr Vicki Cowling OAM and the artists, together with the writers, including 'page-maker' Evelyn Cronk, who all wholeheartedly embraced the idea.

'We have enjoyed meeting the writers and working with them. Producing this book has been a wonderful collaboration,' said Nance Silverman on behalf of the Painting for Pleasure group.

'Writings inspired from art and art inspired by the written word provided a creative challenge for both groups, but the project wouldn't have reach fruition without financial support from the Bayside U3A Executive and generous donors,' added Dr Threadgold. 'We're delighted and it's a fitting tribute to mark the tenth anniversary of Bayside U3A.'



Stories and paintings reflect both local scenes such as a notorious trial at the Brighton Courthouse and the reflected tranquility of Albert Park Lake to Paris street scenes and a pilgrim's progress on Camino de Santiago. As writer Vivienne Player says in the book's preface:

'We all see the world and interpret it differently; hence the variety of styles, voices, formats and media in this collection.'

THE TAXI'S WHEELS SQUEAL Evelyn Cronk © 2023

My body heat is making my clothes stick to the taxi's vinyl seat. I regret choosing a cream silk shirt and linen trousers for the meeting with the legendary Kerry Packer.

Silk and linen clothes do very well in Melbourne but, to my chagrin, not in this humid Sydney weather. I look out the car window marvelling at people walking about as if this dripping, breathless, enervating heat isn't happening. I feel like crepe paper left out in the rain.

My phone rings; I fish it out of my briefcase. It's large and heavy, like carting around a brick. *They'll have to make the things smaller*, I think, as I pull up the aerial and press the answer button.

'Evelyn.' It's my executive producer's voice.

'I'm nearly there, Jill.'

'I'm not. My plane was turned back to Melbourne.' A pause, a beat. 'You'll have to meet Kerry by yourself.'

Humidity and crumpled clothing concerns vanish. Completely winded, a sensation of ice water running down my spine replaces the heat. It doesn't bring relief. I am gripped with pure horror. My stomach threatens to reject my lunch.

'Meet Kerry Packer by myself?' My voice sounds like a mouse squeak. 'Noooo Jill, I can't do that. I was only coming to the meeting with you because I'm here finishing an edit.'

'You know enough about the project. You'll be fine.'

'But ...' I stop, I recognise that "steel claw in the velvet paw" tone in Jill's voice. The voice that ensures Jill gets the results she wants.

'My secretary has faxed the documents to Film Australia. They're waiting for you at Kerry's office. I'll call you later.'

The phone clicks.

The taxi's wheels squeal as it stops suddenly at a red light. It's outside a typical Sydney pub. Green tiles half way up the wall to allow regular hosing. Through the open car window, the smell of beer wafts towards me, further assaulting my heaving stomach. Men in singlets and Stubbies shorts, are drinking on the footpath. More jugs of beer are lined up on the shelf against the wall. Clearly this is the way to keep up fluid intake in this climate.

'Pull over please.'

The driver pulls into the kerb under a No Standing sign. I am beyond caring.

'Please wait.'

Raucous laughter as I run the gauntlet of leering men. 'Hey girlie. The silk department's round the corner.'

They mean the Ladies Lounge; I ignore them. 'A brandy and water please.' I ask the barman. He pours the tot of brandy with a water jug beside. I gulp it and rush out. The cab takes off. My stomach apparently grateful for the brandy, settles just a little.

Inside the iconic Packer headquarters, the air conditioning provides a little relief. The receptionist hands me a manila envelope. I scan the contents. Story synopses, director's notes, casting, budgets, timelines. I might just manage this if Mr Packer doesn't throw me any questions out of left field.

Upstairs, I wait in the reception area to his office suite. I try to draw some courage from the unseen presence of women such as Nene King, Ita Buttrose, Helen Dally, Lisa Wilkinson and other legendary women who must have sat here before a first encounter with the boss. How did they feel?

'Mr. Packer will see you now.' The PA gives me a soft smile.

I feel those other women gently drape a gossamer fine cloak of support across my shoulders. I enter the inner office; the door closes behind me.

'Good afternoon, Mr. Packer.'

Anna Marie, Anna Marie. The plaintive voice of Jim Reeves echoes through the warm evening air and the sounds of laughter and chatter fill the village square. The carnival has arrived.

I watch quietly, taking in these sights, sounds, and smells of the outside world. The dodgem cars are very noisy; they smell funny and look a little scary. A man collects the money until all the cars are occupied and then they set off, children screaming with excitement as they drive around. I listen to the crackling and screeching of the cars as they whiz past, some with the aim of going round in circles. Others are hell-bent on ramming into other cars, much to the delight of the driver when this happens — which seems to occur quite often. When two cars become wedged together after a crash, the man rushes over to separate the vehicles. I'm not sure about the dodgems ... how do they move around? Do they use petrol? I can't see any wheels.

No one in this village has a car, apart from the priests, the doctor and the postmistress. Usually, we walk to the church, three miles away every Sunday morning, or if we are lucky, we may be able to cycle. We have to fast before receiving communion, so we haven't eaten since the evening before. Stomachs growling with hunger, we stop off to buy sweets around the half-way mark on the way home. Occasionally, we are lucky and the priest picks us up and we get to ride in his car for the return journey.

The carnival comes to town every couple of years, and at other times a circus arrives as if by magic. Where do these people come from? I wonder. Along with plays performed by local amateur theatre groups, these events from the outside world are the highlight of our entertainment.

Sometimes I watch on weekdays as the bus comes into the village at 11am for the one-hour trip to Dublin. It returns at 6pm and if there is no one waiting to board, the driver throws a bundle of newspapers on the pavement outside the post office and keeps on driving.

I walk on, giving the dodgems a miss. The swing boats look more interesting. Wooden boats are suspended above the ground. One person seated on each end of the boat pulls on a rope to build up momentum and make the boat swing. It looks like hard work, but maybe I'll try that with my friend later.

As I stroll around, I can see the blue hazy outline of the mountains in the distance. Daddy says they are called the 'Wicklow mountains'. But we don't live in Wicklow.

Oh-oh, yes I'm the great pretender, the sounds of another sad song fill the air. Anna Marie must be a woman's name, I decide, but I have no idea about this song. What does it mean? And why is he pretending? I pause to watch the merry-go-round. I wonder how it feels, going round and round in circles, sitting on a hobby horse?

'Step right up, step right up!' a man calls out in a high-pitched singsong voice, jingling some coins in his cupped hands. He wears a bag around his shoulder into which he puts the money he collects from selling tickets. 'Buy your tickets here for the wheel of fortune. Just a few more tickets left before we spin the wheel. See the lovely prizes. Step right up.' Now this is more interesting. I remain in the background as my mother suddenly appears from the crowd and buys some tickets. I inspect the prizes from a distance: soft toys, crockery, ornaments, vases ... things we don't buy very often as they are expensive.

Eventually, after all the tickets are sold, and with a great deal of drama and several pushes to build up speed, the man spins the wheel. It spins for what seems an eternity, then gradually it slows down, and the rubber marker makes a flapping noise and lands on three or four numbers briefly before going on to the next number on the wheel, while the crowd cheers or jeers depending on how close it is to their ticket. 'Number 13!' the man announces. I see my mother check her tickets and smile. She puts her hand in the air and steps forward to claim her prize. 'There you are, Mrs,' the man says in a loud voice, 'It's your lucky day!' and hands her a pair of China dogs. 'I never win anything,' she says, and laughs, shaking her head.

The China dogs sat in pride of place on either side of our mantelpiece for years, a reminder of the time the outside world came to our village.

This grandson turned 18 years a few months ago. His birthday was on a Sunday. On the Monday he got his driver's license without a hitch. He probably has forgotten how he loved looking for wheels, and naming them, when a small boy. But it certainly taught me what a brilliant and inventive thing a wheel is. And I learnt how they are everywhere.
